

2018 was a very productive year for our Goodwill!

The Leadership Team, along with the Board, created the mission, vision, values and purpose language that we are now cascading to all our teammates here at Goodwill. Our goal is for all team members to know our mission statement by heart: "We help people overcome challenges to employment" and live our values of Respect, Integrity, Commitment and Innovation. These values are the foundation of everything we do.

We stayed very busy in 2018 with community activities such as serving as a Pacesetter Organization for the United Way campaign, rebranding our stores at NW Expressway and Council and at Windsor Hills with a fresh, bright new look with mission messaging. We plan to continue rebranding until all our stores and attended donation centers are complete!

We also received accreditation from the Oklahoma Board of Private Vocational Education, creating the Goodwill Career Pathways Institute. We were selected to receive the Oklahoma City Community Foundation's "Great Idea Challenge" grant for our new Employment & Training Alliance. This effort will enable stakeholders in our region to better align services, share information, and reduce barriers to employment for Oklahoma jobseekers.

Financially, our Goodwill operated in the black for the first time since 2014. Our Donated Goods Retail group had 15 stores that broke sales records.

Though we lost some State Use contracts mid-year, our team rose to the challenge and transitioned staff to other positions while landing a janitorial contract with public television network OETA.

2018 was a year of transformation for our Goodwill. The year 2019 will be one of building infrastructure and integrating mission, vision and values into the entire organization to fulfill our goal of helping people reach their highest level of selfsufficiency and as a result, strengthening our community.

oodwill's donated goods and retail operations play a significant role in supporting mission services. These services help individuals overcome challenges to employment.

In 2018, Goodwill Stores & Donation Centers saw continuous improvement in safety, processes, and customer experience. These improvements are ongoing and are an integral part of our new Strategic Plan.

Each year, our donors and shoppers help us carry out our mission through their generosity. As gently-used items are donated, Goodwill employees process these goods, which are then sold in our retail stores and outlet store. Funds raised by the community's donations are used to provide GICO's wide array of educational and employment services.

We are committed to improving our standards and processes internally for high-quality outcomes. To better serve our communities, we are introducing retail management training and reorganizing existing store fronts and donation centers.



It wasn't too long ago that Leigh George found herself where no one ever expects to be – living under a bridge, homeless, and addicted to drugs with a felony conviction to boot.

Today, however, Leigh wakes up every morning sober, living in her own home, knowing that God has special plans for her today and every day.

"I'm not where I used to be," she says. "My worst day is not that bad."

Finding a job with a felony conviction on her record was nearly impossible until Leigh found Goodwill.

"I always tell people what our mission is, and that I'm an example of that."

Her career at Goodwill has played a vital part in regaining her self-worth and confidence. Leigh started with Goodwill in March. 2018 as a shift lead and through her hard work and dedication, she was quickly promoted to assistant store manager.

In 2019, she was promoted again, to store manager of Goodwill's Store 29 in Midwest City.

"I am proud of myself," she says."I work really hard. For me, it's not a job, it's a way of life."

Her strength to share her story, Leigh says, comes from God.

"I don't get to succeed in life unless I share with people," she says. "There are people out there who are waiting for me to do what God wants me to do — to share with people. That's why I love Goodwill because life is about humanity and being a good person."

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n January, 2018, Melanie Elliott, Director of Community Workforce at GICO was invited to join the Oklahoma City Mayor's Committee on Disability Concerns. The Committe is a nonprofit that works to promote access and inclusion to all the city's residents and visitors with disabilities. The group works to create awareness of issues and solutions for the public.

"We try to use the power of the community in our collective areas of expertise to have a greater impact on individuals with disabilities in Oklahoma City," Elliott said.

The organization is comprised of volunteers who donate their time and expertise to help Oklahoma City become as accessible and inclusive as possible for individuals with disabilities.

oodwill Works is a vocational training program designed to assist individuals in acquiring work experience, job readiness skills, and vocational exploration. This program is geared toward defining an individual's career goal.

Goodwill Works utilizes supervised work crews, classroom instruction, and a variety of community experience to train the participant on basic responsibilities and appropriate work habits, attitudes, and personal and social adjustment skills needed to be successful in employment.

The goal of Goodwill's Supported Employment programs, including Goodwill Works and Goodwill Milestones is to assist participants with building career skills that prepare them for competitive, integrated employment in the community.

oodwill Industries of Central Oklahoma's Job Connection Center provides staff and IT resources to assist anyone who walks through our door with employment services, including job searches, email account creation, resume building, phone calls with prospective employers, and more.

Our ICC also serves as an entry point for individuals to connect with skills development workshops that are offered through the Goodwill Career Pathways Institute, such as Google IT courses, interviewing tips and practice workshops, professional dress, and etiquette courses.

At Goodwill Industries of Central Oklahoma, in 2018, 10 individuals earned their Certificate of High School Equivalency through our TANF/HSE trainings. On average, these journeys took about seven months and the program received overwhelmingly positive feedback. "I love it!m " said one participant. "Please never change. I'm truly blessed to be here!"



inding Freedom: Angela discovers life of helping others

ngela Kaelin has quite a story to tell. Hers is one of overcoming desperate obstacles — abuse, cancer, seclusion.

But overcome she has. Once upon a time, Angela was held hostage by her then-husband, who abused her daily and forbade her any semblance of freedom.

Today, Angela is free. Where once, disease threatened her life, today she is healthy.

Where once, Angela couldn't imagine what the outside world looked and felt like, today she enjoys the little things; the sunlight, a trip to the movies, taking care of her own home, spending time with family.

It was blind hope that brought her to Goodwill where she found acceptance and a job as a janitor.

Today, Angela is in full charge of her life. She works as an administrative assistant in Goodwill's lob Connection Center, helping others who once had as little hope for the future as she had.

"I'm doing something that I never thought I'd do," Angela said. "I'm helping other people help themselves."

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Contract Services Janitorial & Unarmed Security



G oodwill Industries of Central Oklahoma provided janitorial services to 26 state-owned buildings through State Use contracts in 2018.

Goodwill Industries of Central Oklahoma was contracted to provide unarmed security services to a total of 13 state agencies from Enid to Oklahoma City to Tulsa in 2018, under the State Use Program.

The security officers participate in Goodwill sponsored continuing education programs. We put security first at Goodwill Industries of Central Oklahoma.

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SUPPORTIVE SERVICES FOR VETERAN FAMILIES



In 2018, the SSVF team moved into a large renovated office space at GICO headquarters.

Services for Veteran Families is a federal grant program of The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. The central Oklahoma SSVF team receives a \$1.59 million grant for Rapid Rehousing and Homelessness Prevention. The Supportive Services for Veteran Families Program (SSVF) provides supportive services to very lowincome veteran families who are homeless or at-risk of becoming homeless. Through the SSVF program, veterans can receive rapid rehousing assistance and employment services to improve their housing and economic stability.

hrough the SSVF program, homeless Veterans and those at-risk of homelessness received more than \$420,000 in additional benefits for an average of \$15,146 per person.

The housing-first model allows these Veterans to sustain their independence, hold jobs, and learn life-skills such as budgeting and paying bills.

Of participants polled, 79% said their lives have been positively impacted because of the services they received at Goodwill.



Pam Henry Blazed Trails for People with Disabilities

Then Pam Henry was only a toddler, she was diagnosed with polio, a disease that ran rampant in the time, disabling children's legs. The disease was highly communicable before the Salk vaccination, and caused panic in society.

Through the years, with the strength that grew within her, Ms. Henry overcame her disability in many ways.

As the final child representing the March of Dimes, she hoped to show that a polio diagnosis wasn't a death sentence or one that would prevent her from reaching many outstanding achievements.

Ms. Henry received a journalism degree from the University of Oklahoma and went on to become the city's first female television anchor. She worked in Washington, D.C., advocating for disability concerns and became chairman of the Mayor's Committee on Disability Concerns.

A long-time member of the Board of Directors for GICO, Ms. Henry was a crusader for the rights and abilities of others with disabilites and other challenges.

Her passing in September, 2018 reminded us all of her indominable spirit, powerful voice for change, and legacy of overcoming obstacles with grace and love.



In Pam Henry's honor, GICO has created the Pam Henry Spirit of Our Mission Award, to be presented each year to an employee who shows his or her dedication to improving life for others with disabilities or challenges to employment.
